Valentine's Day movie review





Math Counts

MATHCOUNTS is a national math competition for middle school students grades 6th-8th. It is for those that are academically inclined in math or are just generally interested in it. In the MATHCOUNTS competition there are four rounds of testing: the sprint round, the target round, the team round, and the countdown round.

The sprint round consists of 30 problems which are to be solved before the time of 40 minutes runs out. This round is an individual round with the questions progressing in difficulty. The target round consists of 8 problems that are given in sets of 2. The problems in the target round are open-ended and take multiple steps to solve within the time limit of 6 minutes. The target round is one of the rounds where a calculator is permitted but many students might end up stumped even with the aid of a calculator. The team round consists of 10 problems to be solved by a team of 4 students collaboratively working together to answer the problems within 20 minutes. Similar to the target round, the team round is the only other round that permits the use of a calculator.

Finally, the countdown round is only for the best of the best. Only the top 10 people to score the most points on the previous rounds can participate in the countdown round. This round is quick-paced, and you are racing against the person next to you whoever gets the answer first will buzz in and answer if they are wrong or if they forget to buzz in then their opponent gets the chance to solve it correctly. It starts with places 9 and 10, whoever wins that round goes again place 8 then 7 and so on until they reach place 1. On the final round whoever wins that round is smart enough to be able to move onto states and that in itself is a huge honor showing their abilities of quick-thinking and problem solving however the person who loses that round also gets to move on as well as the highest scoring group from the team round. After being able to move onto states if you are smart enough to win states as well then you will move onto nationals.
